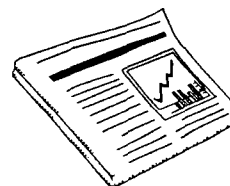

COMMUNITY SERVICE OPPORTUNITY

Denise Feldman, a representative of 20/20 Vision, has contacted me recently concerning her organizations need for volunteers, especially students. 20/20 is a nonprofit organization which aids citizens in the process of writing to their political representatives about issues of political concern. Each month, the organization sends its members a postcard documenting a political or environmental issue which is presently being debated; the card then gives recommendations for actions which any citizen can take in writing or by phone. The cards are prepared and mailed by a core group of 6-8 members. The opportunities for volunteering to help 20/20 include: being part of the core group (who decide the topics each month), researching and producing cards, assisting membership drives, and for computer hacks, 20/20 does have members affiliated with PeaceNet and EnviroNet. By initiating such cooperative efforts with students now, 20/20 wishes to eventually make an independent 20/20 group for students in the UNCC community.
